Visit of Professor Lord David Alton



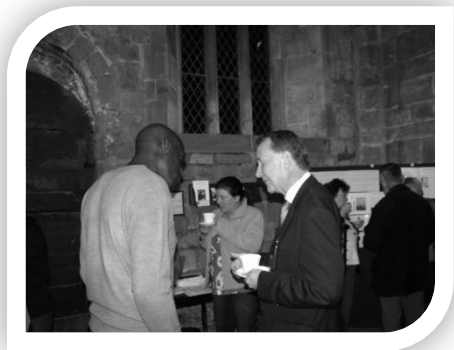
On 9th September the Church hosted a talk by Professor Lord David Alton where he spoke about “Active citizenship – our duty to play our part”. David started his working life as a teacher, and then was elected to Liverpool City Council and later to the House of Commons to rep-

resent a Liverpool constituency as a Liberal. In 1997 he stood down from party politics and was nominated to the House of Lords as an Independent Life Peer. He is also a Professor of Citizenship at Liverpool John Moores University.

David based his talk on the Summer of Discontent in August 2011, when riots took place in many cities. The condition of England is not good: there has been a wave of scandals, the country is suffering from a lack of economic stability and communities have lost clear spiritual leadership. David is particularly concerned that three quarters of a million British children have no contact with their fathers due to breakdown of relationships, and he believes that we all need to ask ourselves some searching questions about the country we have made and the country we want it to be.

David believes that in modern society too much emphasis is placed on selfishness and materialism, when in fact the emphasis should be placed on the common good. To achieve this it is important to educate people to be good citizens, so he has established the hugely successful Roscoe Foundation for Citizenship. The Foundation has staged over one hundred public lectures and set up a good citizen award scheme operating in many schools which makes awards to young people for personal acts of courage and fund raising for good causes.

To see a fundamental change in society and avoid a repetition of the events of this August it is the duty of each of us to play our part – we can change our society if we all participate.



Steve Fletcher thanked David for coming to talk to us and presented him with a cheque for £100 for the Epiphany Trust, a charity that David is involved in.

The evening concluded with refreshments kindly provided by the catering committee and a question and answer session.

Bell Matters

Bell ringers are a very mixed bunch of people.

They range from very young to very old (or what used to be very old!) In fact, the leaflets encouraging people to take up bell ringing say suitable for all ages 8-80.



I personally know ringers well in their 80's and still ringing, As well as the age spectrum they also do a wide variety of jobs from high powered ones to those of us who earn or who have earned a living doing very humble things.

I often think that one of the joys of ringing is mixing with all the different characters, both male and female. Talking about females, it is only in the last 50 years or so that women have started ringing in any significant numbers. Now without ladies, ringing (which used to be purely a male occupation) would be in a very sorry state.

We rang a quarter peal on the Shotwick Bells for Harvest Festival service. This was in memory of Henry Norman, who was a bell ringer for most of his adult life and tower captain at Neston for quite a number of years. As most of you know Henry was until recently a very hard worker for St Michael's and will be sadly missed by all of us.

Deanery Synod Report

A well attended meeting took place on 13th October at Saughall which was Chaired by the new Rural Dean, Rev'd David Fisher.

Following general business there was a fascinating and detailed presentation entitled 'The Authorised Version of the Bible - is it relevant today?' given by John Isherwood. John is an acknowledged expert on the history of the Bible and his illustrated talk considered the Bible's development from the earliest Greek texts, via ancient Hebrew texts together with noted historical and key dates along the way. Naturally the importance of the King James Bible was underlined and John brought a personal copy of a very early Geneva Bible for the audience to admire. John's half hour talk was warmly applauded and a short Q&A session ensued.

The Rural Dean then invited Rev Brian Harris to give the host parish report. Brian examined in depth the opportunities, challenges and issues that affected Saughall and he suspects, many other churches in the diocese. He reminded us that until 1921 Saughall had been a 'sub-office' of Shotwick. It now serves a population of 3000 but attendances have now dwindled to about 30 for the most popular 10.30 Sunday Service. Close relationships with the local Methodist church and St Bartholomew's nearby mean that collectively they are doing what they can to bolster interest and attendance. GAP targets help to focus the mind.

Brian indicated the severe financial strain that existed - £70000 required for the roof and a burdensome Parish share. In fact default on Parish share was inevitable on probably 2 forthcoming occasions. Brian then advised the audience that he and his wife were to move nearer Northwich as she has been appointed as Vicar at Tiverton (currently she is Curate at Neston). Brian stated that she would be starting in January and for the time being he would commute but he stated that he would have to look for another position nearer Northwich. Clearly Brian and his wife will be much missed after 7 years in Saughall and the Synod expressed their thanks.

Harvest Festival

Our Harvest Festival took place on 9th October and the first thing to say is how beautiful the Church looked, dressed in thanksgiving for the produce and flowers and for the talent of those who put it all together.



Our guest preacher was Bishop Keith and he began by reminding us that it was Salt Sunday and Cheshire is the County for salt. He chose as his text Matthew 5: 13-16. Jesus talking to his disciples by Lake Galilee. As the Bishop said, they had not

been chosen from the rich and powerful and He told these ordinary everyday men 'You are the salt of the earth. You are the Light of the World'.



Our day finished as usual with a Harvest Ploughman's supper followed by home made apple and blackberry crumble. We extend many thanks to Dorothy and Martin Coar, our hosts at Shotwick Hall, along with the many helpers who made the event a success. This was a fund raising

effort for the Church which realised £500.
