## **WHAT'S THE ROLE OF OUR PARISH CHURCH IN THIS COMMUNITY TODAY?**

In the New Testament, 'church' primarily meant the people gathered by Christ, not the building. Early Christians met in homes, streets, and public spaces, long before dedicated church buildings became common.

So, when we talk about a parish church today, the building should never be confused with the Church itself.

At the same time, buildings can still matter because they support and express the life of the community. A healthy approach might hold both truths together: the Church is fundamentally a living community of disciples; the building exists to serve that community and its mission.

Much of real 'church' life happens in homes, cafes, schools, care homes, food banks, workplaces and increasingly in online spaces. But also, in our friendships and acts of care to one another.



Our parish church building is still, however, a visible anchor (a suitable metaphor for a church dedicated to St Nicholas, the patron saint of sailors) for a dispersed community. It's also a testimony to the generations of people in our community who have worshipped there and built and maintained what is a beautiful and to them (and many of us now) a very special, sacred place.

While the church is indeed the people, not the building, communities still need physical places where strangers can gather safely; where continuity is visible; where grief, worship and celebration can be held and shared publicly.

I love to see our village hall once again hosting lots of varied events. But the church building has a different role – yes, it can, to a degree, host some events, (subject to the limitations of its layout), but it is also a very different focus for something many of us only realise we need when we face loss, crisis, or when we celebrate those starting out in life – infants or young couples. Or when we need to share our thoughts in prayer, or worship together.

The church building is also where prayer can have a rooted, communal expression and where the wider community knows it can turn in moments of need.

A church building must not become the object of the Church's mission. It should remain a tool for the Church's mission. If the building helps people encounter God, care, and belong to one another, serve the vulnerable, and remain connected across generations, it is fulfilling its purpose.



As a church, we need to be involved in, and relevant to our community. Only then can we expect our community to value both the building and what we do in and outside of it.

## VACANCY UPDATE

The initial closing date is 31 May and while it is hoped there will soon be applicants to interview, it is important to be realistic about the fact that it may take time to find the right person.

When she chaired the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, the Rural Dean, the Rev Vicky Barrett, cautioned that the process may take some time and that there may be quiet times when there was no news.

The appointment process is now in the hands of the Patron, the Diocese and the Parish Representatives of Burton and Shotwick who are not allowed to discuss progress. As a result there will not be any more announcements about the vacancy until a new vicar is appointed. Please place all those involved in the vacancy process in your prayers.

### Holy Communion at Home

In preparation for the vacancy three Eucharistic ministers were approved by John Coyne and endorsed by the Bishop of Birkenhead, Julie Conalty.

They are: Anne Parsons, Tony Carter and John Church and they will be supported by Lay Readers John Morris-Best and Philip Hillman.

Collectively they will deliver Holy Communion at home using bread and wine that will have been consecrated by an ordained minister at a Holy Communion Service following the appropriate liturgy.

### Bereavement & End of Life Visiting

Local ordained clergy will normally be asked to assist under these circumstances and, if necessary, further assistance will be sought from the Rural Dean.

## ***Giving and Generosity*** ***Supporting Church Ministry***

Planned Giving is absolutely essential to carrying out the ministry of the Parish. The ministry that St Nicholas' Church currently provides is only possible through the generous and regular giving by church members.

The donations the church receives pay for our vicar, the vicarage, our essential building and churchyard maintenance, hospitality, utilities, church cleaning, admin support, photocopier, and other 'behind the scenes' expenses.

Despite not having a vicar, throughout 2025 and 2026 the PCC has maintained its full parish share to Chester Diocese (what we pay for the minister and housing etc.) which this year amounts to circa £3,100 pcm. We have also maintained donations to charities that the church has supported for many years. This has only been possible by dipping into our small amount of reserves: reserves that can only be spent once.

# Burton Mere Wetlands

Burton Mere is becoming alive with new life. Many ducklings and goslings may be seen, and the first Avocet Chicks and Lapwing chicks were reported at the beginning of May.

The large flock of Knot remain, usually on Centenary Pool, and amongst them may be found Spotted Redshank, Ruff, Black-tailed Godwit, and Bar-tailed Godwit.

Walking along the paths visitors are entertained by the songs of summer visitors, including Reed Warbler, Sedge Warbler, Cetti's Warbler, Grasshopper Warbler, Blackcap, Whitethroat, and Lesser Whitethroat.

# Visit to Fordhall Organic Farm

Jenny Sneddon writes about a visit to [Fordhall Farm](#) with two friends on Tuesday 19 May. Longtime Burton resident Chris Lunt had been on their board and, as Jenny says, anything Chris was involved with would be interesting.

“What an uplifting experience. The farm is run as a Community Benefit Society with 8000 shareholders and is now in its twentieth year. The Hollins family managed to avoid eviction as tenants by raising £800,000, selling £50 shares. Charlotte and her brother Ben both run the farm with a voluntary Board of 14.

Look after the soil and work with your local community is their mantra. Arthur Hollins was a man ahead of his time. Walking round the farm reminded my friends and me of what farms were like in the 1960s and 1970s when we were growing up - plenty of insects, birds, cow pats and plant diversity. On 150 acres they employ 30 people, and they have 100 volunteers.



There are loads of activities but the main community thread focuses on long term education programmes for mainstream and non-mainstream children. Not just here today and gone tomorrow, but following students through their high school journey and on to college. There is a butchery (run by a former school student), a farm shop with a *huge* selection, and a restaurant. Animals are pasture fed and butchered locally. Selling is direct via the farm shop or via farm catering vans.

The Hollins family hope their community benefit model will be a template for other farms. They have acquired a donated farm in Devon where the owner had nobody to leave it to.

I feel very positive about this initiative and think it the best option for preserving soil communities and jobs so I will be affording them what support I can.”
