### Reflection from Sue

#### Three in One; One in Three



A month ago, a lot of people were waving one of these as they celebrated the crowning of our new King. It sums up our country, our nationality. We see it on 'buy British' or 'made in Britain' logos.

Yet it is actually three flags in one. The English cross of St George (which is the fat red one), the Scottish flag of St Andrew (the white tilted X against a blue background) and, superimposed on that, the red tilted X of Ireland's St Patrick. One flag, representing the UK, which gathers together the national saints' flags of three countries. It is both one and three at the same time.

That's a good way to understand what the God Christians worship each week is: one, uno, a unified, single God, who expresses his identity in three ways that we can relate to – as a Father who creates, as a Son, who lived among humanity as Jesus, and God as Holy Spirit. All three add up to the one God. Christianity, Islam and Judaism all believe in One God – but the idea of a Three in One God sets Christianity apart.

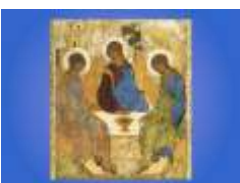


It is *one* name, yet *three* expressions of who God is.

The word 'trinity' doesn't appear in the Bible, but the different ways in which God expresses himself is written everywhere.

- Way back at the start of the Bible, we read about God speaking the world into existence whilst 'the Spirit of God was hovering over' the formless molecules.
- When God creates humanity, he declares: 'Let us make man in *our* image, in *our* likeness, acknowledging that the one God is also diverse.
- Meanwhile, we've just celebrated (at Pentecost) God's Holy Spirit being poured out on all who trust that Jesus' death on the Cross has 'paid for' their failure and rebellion against God: the Holy Spirit of Jesus, who knows the Father's will and translates it into our human experience.

Now, we know that sometimes relations between the three nations represented in our Union Jack are difficult, as each tries to act independently. But with God, that's never the case. There is complete harmony in all the ways he expresses himself.



Indeed, each person of the Trinity aims to honour the other, not diminish them. Jesus explains this to his followers in John ch 16: <sup>14</sup> [the Spirit of Truth] will glorify me because it is from me that he will receive what he will make known to you. <sup>15</sup> All that belongs to the Father is mine. That is why I said the Spirit will receive from me what he will make known to you.'

And that Unity in God shows us how God wants us all to live and serve together. We are all very different but our differences mustn't get in the way of what God calls his friends to be and to do. Variety can result in creativity, but also requires grace and respect for each other's gifts.

All this isn't meant to confuse us but to help us know God well, and in a rich and life-shaping way.

Firstly we discover that our amazing, complex God wants to communicate with us and relate to us. He inspired poets and historians and prophets to record his dealings with humanity in the Bible; Jesus actively demonstrated God-ness for us, talking and teaching in human communities; now the Spirit speaks of God in each individual's experience.

Secondly, God lives in a fellowship and invites us into fellowship with him as well – look, there is space at the table for us! Indeed, it is Jesus' prayer in John 17 that the quality of our fellowship, our unity as a group of God's followers, will be a means of demonstrating God's loving embrace to those who don't yet know him, so that the whole world can be included.



Above all, God is bound together by love. And it is out of love that God wants us to live up to the potential he created in each one of us, to live our best lives for Him.

The following prayer is one I use almost every morning as I seek to align myself with God's best, to put myself under his flag or banner. I invite you to use it for yourselves.

May it help you each morning to come to experience more of our amazing, 3 in 1 / trinitarian God!

Good morning Heavenly Father,  
good morning Lord Jesus,  
good morning Holy Spirit.

Heavenly Father, I worship you  
as the creator and sustainer of the universe.

Lord Jesus, I worship you,  
Saviour and Lord of the world.

Holy Spirit, I worship you,  
sanctifier of the people of God.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit.

Heavenly Father, I pray that I may live this day  
in your presence

and please you more and more.

Lord Jesus, I pray that this day  
I may take up my cross  
and follow you.

Holy Spirit, I pray that this day  
you will fill me with yourself  
and cause your fruit to ripen in my life:

love, joy, peace,  
patience, kindness, goodness,  
faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Holy, blessed and glorious Trinity,  
three persons in one God,  
have mercy upon me.
