To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven: A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to uproot.

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BUZZING ABOUT THE FUTURE REVD JOHN COYNE

I have three ideas buzzing in my head at present and I want to share them, not just with the church but with the whole community.

Firstly, I am planning to take our two PCCs (Parochial Church Councils) away at the end of March to clarify and discern a vision for the ministry of our local Churches. It is, I believe, God's call on the Church to discern what its priorities will be in each season. My understanding of a Church's vision is that it is a forward-looking picture of what all of us are called to be part of – a healthy, outward looking community/organisation (which, in the case of the Church, is inspired and enlivened by our faith in Jesus Christ).

It strikes me that individuals do well to have a vision for their own lives. With a forward-looking picture of what we want for our lives, we can avoid being driven only by circumstances and demands. Similarly, a community – a village or town – needs to discern a vision for its future prosperity and its needs. I commend the Burton Residents Association for circulating its questionnaire on what residents want for the future of this village. I trust that the exercise will engage the whole community so that our villages might be as vibrant as possible in the years to come. We also have a busy Social Club and Village Hall for Burton and Puddington which do not exist elsewhere. Let's applaud the energy of those who manage these resources and support what happens there.

The second idea buzzing around my grey matter is how each us might engage with the 40 days of Lent, which starts on 22 February (Ash Wednesday). If you are thinking of stopping reading at this point, please press on for a few sentences. Lent is traditionally a time of reflection and renewal, when Christians

enrich their faith in readiness for Easter. Even some people without clear beliefs give things up for Lent and regard it as a kind of spiritual 'spring clean'. Others take things on during these six weeks, for the aim of benefitting others. Christians may seek to develop their generosity and engage in daily acts of random kindness.

Some may seek to deepen their prayer life and participation in worship, alongside service. In the coming weeks I will publish ideas about Lent for Church members. But the idea of Lent can also be a time of renewal in different ways for everyone. A spring clean of our lives is well advised for all of us from time to time. We might need to de-clutter the endless activities that occupy our time. Acts of generosity, kindness and community enrichment is a way of ensuring life is not focussed on one's self. The options are endless - for example, how about;

- organising a car wash in the community, and asking for donations to support a specific local charity, a food bank or a community project?
- inviting those you already know and those you don't, for drinks or a simple meal, to develop our sense of community and friendship? Let hospitality be the hallmark of living here.
- consider pausing your streaming service subscriptions and donating the saved funds? Meanwhile, imagine what you and your family might do instead of streaming TV and movies! Options include reading a book and sharing your thoughts or playing board games or long walk and talking to each other as you do so.

Thirdly, I am buzzing over the Church's wish to become a truly multi-generational Church in Burton, Puddington and Shotwick. As local churches we are genuinely here for every generation but are under-represented among children and young families. We are hoping to raise funds to appoint a part-time Families and Children's worker to help us turn that around. Shotwick Church has its own ideas of engaging with children in schools near and far.

It so happens that our villages are currently seeing new families moving in all the time. Let's welcome them with open arms in our churches and the wider community to the benefit of everyone. And, as you read this, if you fit

the profile of being younger, why not chat with myself and other community leaders on what you would appreciate as well as what you have to offer among us?

With these ideas and more, Lent could be truly transformational for everyone. I hope it is for you.

Tales From **foodbank**

It's January at the Foodbank. The run up to the end of last year was very busy. Usually the end of the year is busier than the



preceding months, but this year was exceptional. The number of clients per week rose by more than 50% between the beginning and end of December, and caused the Foodbank to decide to open some of its centres between Christmas and New Year. Emergency cover is usually provided by the council and demand is low. However, it was worth opening the centres this year with 39 clients attending over the 3 days.

The chair of the Wirral Foodbank, Phillip Davies, writes:

"The Christmas period saw a substantial increase in the number of people receiving emergency food parcels. Once again, Wirral Foodbank played a crucial role in helping those in need. Thanks to all who supported the Christmas Tesco collection. Sadly, the evidence indicates that as the cost-of-living crisis worsens, the demand for our services will continue well into 2023. Let us hope and pray that the New Year brings a new focus on tackling the underlying causes of poverty so that people no longer need to rely on foodbanks and other charities to provide basic necessities.

In the first weeks of January the number of clients has dropped back to the level of the beginning of December but this is still more than 40% higher than it was in August."

As Phillip notes, Tesco supports Trussell Trust foodbanks around the country by offering two weekends a year when we are in their stores and can encourage their

customers to donate food and money. In an outstanding show of generosity donations at the Wirral stores were up 42% over Christmas 2021. And, in context, although the Tesco Christmas Collection contributed 7.5 tonnes of food in Wirral, this is just 2% of what you and others like you donated in 2022. *Amazing*.



As the Foodbank manager says,

We are more than food

Emergency food is not the answer to food poverty. We seek to address the underlying issues, by working with professional organisations. On behalf of Wirral Foodbank, Citizens Advice Wirral delivers **Foodbank Plus**, a dedicated advice service, tackling the root causes of food poverty. Since 2020, **Foodbank Plus** has supported 6,000 people, delivering over £273,000 in financial benefits (benefit entitlements, debt write-off, grants, and white goods). In addition, we have set-up two pilot projects

(1) Energy Projects Plus, who provide practical support to individuals in fuel crisis;

(2) Wirral Mind, who provide mental health support.

Foodbank Plus and other projects are funded through the generosity of our

donors; they are at the centre of our strategy to remove the need for foodbanks, making a real difference and in many cases the support offered can be life changing.

As your donations of food provide the emergency food, your monetary donations are what funds these vital services. In the Garden

Spring is Eagerly Awaited !

The garden has limited colour at the moment but the Viburnum is still flowering together with the red Skimmia and the old purple/white flower on the Hebe.

There are masses of catkins on Harry Lauder's Walking Stick (Twisted Hazel).

Green spears of Spring flowering bulbs are growing constantly.

Snowdrops: Galanthus nivalis, Flore Peno (double), elwesii. woronowii, ikariae and beluga are the



varieties - all eagerly awaited! The first to flower clump is visible from the kitchen window.

Sweet Pea seeds: White Supreme, Nimbus and Winston Churchill are sown in pots which are currently in situ on the kitchen windowsill. Unnamed varieties are seeds gathered from last year's mixtures. Hopefully, they will germinate!



The greenhouse and seed trays will have a further clean in preparation for more seed sowing.

The Camellias have many buds but are yet to flower.

The fleeces are ready in case there is a cold snap.

Many birds have enjoyed feasts in the garden (after plundering the rowan

berries) - Jay, Redwing (only one), Blue, Great and Long-Tailed Tits, Blackbirds, Nuthatch (pictured) and, of course, Robbie and Rosemary Robin.

BURTON MERE WETLANDS Rare Bird Sighting on the Reserve...

It's hard to believe we're almost through January, and the busy festive season a fading memory. The year has started with some challenging weather, firstly persistent winds and more recently the cold snap causing frozen ground conditions making life hard for visitors and birds alike!

With dusk stretching ever-later, we're bidding farewell to our winter closing time on 1 February, back to a 5pm close throughout February before March when the reserve remains open until 6pm.

We've already had one rare bird this year, when a long-billed dowitcher (yes, it's a mouthful!) – a scarce American accidental vagrant, though one we're quite familiar with after seeing one here each of the past three years – turned up on 11 January.

As exciting as some find them, we're not here just for the rarities, and the winter months are arguably the best time to appreciate what makes the wetlands of the Dee Estuary one of the most important homes for birds in the whole of Europe. Vast flocks of thousands of waders, ducks and geese adorn the reserve, and can still be enjoyed into March before they begin their northward migration to breed. The ducks are particularly good entertainment at present, performing their courtship rituals in order to get paired up before they depart here.

After a three year break due to Covid, then a dearth of big tides in 2022, we've just had our first Parkgate High Tide Watch of the year which was incredibly popular, although the calm weather conditions mean the incoming tide didn't flood the marsh to any significant degree. We have three more dates coming up in late February, followed by two more in late March – check our website events.rspb.org.uk/deestuary for details.

School half term is fast approaching, and although we don't have any specific family events this time around, we always have a fun family quiz trail available daily, so bear us in mind if you're looking for days out with your kids. Plus, the Wild Play area with its 'den building' is always loved by young explorers!

Work is well underway on our highly anticipated café, although we have slipped behind schedule so installation work will still be going on into spring, with opening hoped to be before the height of summer.

In the meantime, our visitor centre still stocks sandwiches, snacks and drinks for you to treat yourself to a picnic lunch and support our conservation work further, with all profits helping us to do more for nature across the Dee Estuary reserve.

As we head to the end of winter and beginning of spring, we'll be welcoming back our iconic avocets within a matter of weeks. They certainly stand out in their elegant monochrome plumage when still surrounded by masses of grey-brown waders and colourful ducks during the transition of seasons.

By March, weather-permitting we'll be seeing and hearing the arrival of smaller summer migrants, such as various warblers, and martins. For now, though, let's enjoy the rest of the winter, with endless bird of prey activity, especially majestic marsh harriers which are now abundant after being a rarity here a decade ago. Plus, we've been treated to stupendous barn owl sightings around dusk for most days since December – head down one afternoon soon to see it!



Several local residents have already used the service and one said:

"I have used them twice so far and payment is roughly the cost of the petrol. My return trip to Arrowe Park hospital was roughly £17.50 and when I asked if I could leave a tip it was declined but "if I wished to round it up" it would be gratefully received as any surplus would go into a general operation fund - my £20 was a fraction of the cost of a taxi."

Voter ID at Polling Stations from May 2023

From 4 May 2023, people who wish to vote in person (including those acting as a proxy), will be required to produce an accepted form of photographic ID to prove their identity before they will be issued with a ballot paper.

This will apply to:

- Local elections
- Town and parish elections
- Neighbourhood planning referendums

UK parliamentary elections (the requirement for voter ID to be provided at UK parliamentary elections will take effect for polls after 5 October 2023)

Police and crime commissioner elections

There is currently no requirement for postal voters to provide photographic identification for the May 2023 election.


Accepted IDs include passport, driving licence and blue badge. Other IDs are acceptable. See the link below.

If you do not have an accepted form of ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate. You need to register to vote before applying for a Voter Authority Certificate. For the local, town parish council elections taking place on Thursday 4 May 2023, the deadline to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate is 5pm on Tuesday 25 April 2023.
