PIONEERS ON THE LOOSE & VERY WELCOME

If you were looking for people who had an instinct and desire to be pioneers would you imagine that you might find them in the Church? Today pioneering ministry, alongside more conventional church life, has become the norm in many areas. This is happening because the landscape of the Church in the United Kingdom has been changing rapidly, with less than 50% of the population now identifying as Christians. In response to this shift, ministry leaders are 'pioneering' new ways of building community and discipleship, outside traditional church contexts.

As a curate back in 1980, I was linked with a group of young-adult Christians who moved from their comfortable Manchester suburb to live on a vast local authority housing estate. They experimented and pioneered new ways of connecting with younger people, who were totally distanced from any church. This was not a gimmick: it involved the hard graft of community ministry and schools work. For some of those who were reached, this ministry



proved so transformational that the wider community became a better place to live in and crime plummeted. So dramatic was the pioneering approach that the police offered funding for this new model of church to continue to develop. It has done so and now become an international movement.

During my career, I have been involved in training ordained and lay ministers who themselves have developed a passion and a set of skills for this sort of ministry. They have started Church among sports people; met with those whose interest in cars led to the formation of a congregation called REVS. One congregation began on a narrowboat on the Thames and attracted mostly business-people working in the City of London. It meets during the week rather than on Sunday.

Here in Burton, St Nicholas Church has run Messy Church for some years



and attracted parents, grandparents and young children who meet on a Saturday afternoon doing crafts, plus sharing food and a short worship time. It has waxed and waned over the years but continues. Over recent months we have started a carer and toddler group called St Nic's Nippers, which meets on Monday mornings in the GVH and is led by our Families and Children's worker, Sheila Dennison. It does not pretend or intend to be a congregation but a community initiative that builds links with parents at a significant time of life both for them and their little ones. Occasionally conversations about faith arise naturally and that is welcomed but never forced. First steps perhaps ...

In September, Sheila will start a weekly lunch-time group for pupils at Bishop Wilson School. Crafts, activity and brief elements of Christian worship will develop and enhance the children's opportunity to explore the Christian faith. Given the beautiful outdoors environment that surrounds our community, we are also looking into starting a Forest Church – meeting outdoors in all seasons and discovering more of God in Creation.

Pioneering ministry involves having a go (and possibly risking failure with some initiatives) because at heart we believe that God blesses the courage and imagination of individuals to develop simple expressions of Church which connect with a wider cross-section of the community. I for one wish I was able to be around longer to see these ideas flourish, alongside more familiar approaches to church life and ministry.

Pipe Organ Overhaul

Fifty years of dirt and grime cleared, including specimens of tiny bats and a baby wren which are now resting in the graveyard ivy.

Philip and Scott (who previously was a HGV driver with a dream of building pipe organs!) of Cartwright & Cartwright worked four days nonstop. Even Karen Cartwright, Philip's wife, was part of the team. They were refreshed daily with a supply of tea & crumpets as they worked tirelessly on our much loved ancient instrument which, according to the booklet 'The Church at the Ford' by Lavinia Whitfield, was secondhand when it was gifted and installed in 1909!

For Pipe Organ buffs, according to Philip Cartwright, the organ was either rebuilt or brought to the Church, possibly by Whiteley of Chester or Jardine of Manchester in 1909 (nameplate has been removed).

Philip further explained to me that the organ case, actions and bellows are certainly from that period but the 'organ within' is much older, evidenced by many factors including the soundboards which are c1850!



Down the Garden Path with Flori Bunda

High Summer

After a glorious week of sunshine up North, settling down on return was going to be difficult.

However, seedlings, pots etc were in perfect order as our neighbour took care of house and garden during our absence.

Russell Lupins have been wonderful and the seeds collected. Roses have been beautiful, not least Rosa Mundi – this rose is spreading through various shrubs. Buff Beauty needed some attention as there was lots of dead wood.



Absent Friends is a lovely rose and has a perfume. It is growing happily in a large pot. Alec's Red is a truly beautiful rose – dark red with a lovely perfume.

'Harry Lauder' (Twisted Hazel) again has had a serious 'prune', and the Lilacs (mauve/white) have also been pruned – hopefully to flower next year. With success there is always failure. The Zinnias matured into strong seedlings, but Larkspur failed to germinate.

The Sweet Peas are wonderful. The eagerly awaited Misty Mountains is in flower – long stems, four florets, mauve fading to white – just as it's description.

The vases are filled with Sweet Peas almost daily. Hopefully, it will be as good for August showing. They are fed once weekly and all tendrils removed which means they need to be tied up almost daily.

The garden looks so lovely – do not look at overgrown areas – more about them next time!

There was a successful hatching of blue/great tits as these youngsters raided the bird feeder. Two immature blackbirds have appeared, one robin, gold/green finches and three greater spotted woodpeckers. Jenny Wren can only be heard!

Tasks to be getting on with:

- Water pots when dry
- Dead head flowers as nescessary
- Remove weeds
- Sit in the garden (if possible)





It's June at the Foodbank. As previously noted the number of clients served has reduced from a post-pandemic high to about what it was pre-pandemic. Donations have also declined over the last year or so. It's not totally clear why this is, but it's likely that the cost of living increases from 2022 onwards are the main cause.



In Wirral, even though things are getting tighter, we're still able to serve all our clients and continue to fund the Foodbank Plus advisors who are an important way to make sure that clients see us temporarily and are then back on their feet. Other Foodbanks are struggling more. It remains the case that far too many people are unable to get by without food support.

New Community Organiser

Recently Wirral Foodbank has had the benefit of a community organiser funded by Trussell Trust. She's been talking with clients and others to see how they can better be served. One of the items that was often mentioned is the need for a face-to-face advice service. The council's One Stop Shop used to provide this but moved to a phone-only service during the pandemic and, despite pressure, has never moved back into the community – primarily because of cost pressures.

But now Wirral Foodbank is proud to have helped set up a Community Advice Hub staffed by the Foodbank, Citizens Advice Bureau, Involve Northwest, Energy Projects Plus, Wirral Change and CAP Wirral. The hub, located in central Birkenhead, will be open on Thursday mornings from 3 July. Wirral Foodbank has always seen its mission as eliminating the need for foodbanks, and providing emergency food while this is still necessary. This is another step in that mission. While Foodbank Plus (CAB support for Foodbank clients) helps to get clients back on their feet this hub will be preventive and avoid people needing emergency food in the first place.

Some Good News

The Chancellor has just delivered a spending review. There are a couple of items of good news in it for Foodbank clients.

- Free School Meals eligibility has been expanded to include everyone in England receiving Universal Credit. This is a big benefit to families who did not previously receive it.
- The Household Support Fund, which has provided critical support since the pandemic, but which was subject to a nail-biting annual review, has been replaced with the Crisis and Resilience Fund of £1 billion per year each year until 2029. Local councils have had the discretion to use this money to support those in need. It's good to see a long-term commitment.



Your donations of food and money continue to provide a lifeline to our neighbours, for which we and they are very grateful. Food donations can be made at many supermarkets. The Wirral Foodbank is looking for rice pudding, tinned potatoes, tinned meat, jam and tinned fruit, while the West Cheshire Foodbank is looking for tinned puddings, tinned potatoes, long life juice, biscuits and jam.

Both Foodbanks also accept monetary donations which they use to bulk buy food as needed and to provide other services to Foodbank clients. Regular donations especially help with financial planning.

Summer Is Here!

Here at Burton Mere Wetlands the pools are alive with young birds. The main scrape has many **Avocet** chicks some of which are now nearly as big as their parents, and every island is alive with fluffy **Black-headed Gull** chicks.

On the water Shelduck babies follow their parents and several families of Canada Geese and Greylag Geese can be seen. The great news, though, comes from the Heronry, where in addition to the Grey Herons and Little Egrets we also have breeding pairs of Great White Egret, Spoonbills and Cattle Egret. We look forward to seeing the 'Teaspoons' (baby Spoonbills) come down from their nest and show themselves on one of the pools.

The Raptors are showing well, with **Sparrowhawk**, **Hobby** and our resident **Marsh Harriers** passing food in mid-air.

Our insect lovers have been seeing many species of Damselfly and Dragonfly, Butterfly (including the Broad-Bodied Chaser and Skipper), Moths, particularly a Hummingbird Hawk Moth and Scarlet Tiger Moth.

June was peak wild orchid season with fabulous Bee Orchids, dainty Pyramidal, Common Spotted, abundant Marsh Orchids and shade loving Broad-leaved Helleborine. You can see all five species along the path from the visitor centre to bunker hide or ask our friendly volunteers to point you in the right direction.

July will see all the chicks growing up and learning to fly, and we will see the Arctic breeding birds beginning to return. **Spotted Redshanks** in their black breeding plumage are often among the early returners.
